


# 'Making a Mark'

### The Restore Trust

The Restore Trust is a social enterprise providing skills, training and jobs to anyone who is long-term unemployed due to social challenges, including ex-offenders, people with addictions and those with behavioural or learning difficulties.



We work closely with a number of employers around Bristol to get those seeking work back into employment. We have a number of connections that look to employ ex-offenders or those that have been out of work for a significant period of time.

We aim to provide the broadest range of services and support to help people improve their skills and increase their chances of employment. To help us achieve these aims we have identified key organisations who share our values and beliefs and with whom we can collaborate to provide the most effective level of service.

The Social Enterprise Mark criteria includes a requirement for all applicants and renewing Mark Holders to provide 'social impact statements', which illustrate how they are striving to meet their social/environmental objectives.

## Social outputs – key measures of support provided

We deliver services that promote social inclusion in both a custodial and community setting and approx. **100** people access our services each month.

This support is structured to provide career advice and assist people back to work, as keeping one ex offender out of prison saves the tax payer approx. £33k per annum.

## Social outcomes – creating economic and social value

As an example of just one project, we are working on the CFO 3 ESF project with an active caseload of approx. 50 beneficiaries, who are considered the hardest to help participants.

This project provides intense case management support to slowly support the participants into training and employment, and to engage them with mainstream services.

This leads to economic and social value benefits to the individuals concerned as well as the wider community.



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
